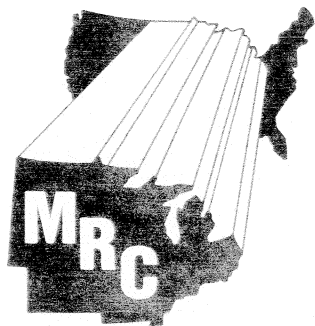

IN THE TWO YEAR COLLEGE

Midwest Regional Conference report to the National Two-Year College Council
Fall 1993

Our move to a fall conference has been a very successful move, based on our first fall conference. We met in Madison Wisconsin October 7-9, following our usual schedule. Madison Area Technical College sponsored our Thursday night wine and cheese reception in the atrium lobby of their campus that was located just across the street from our meeting hotel. The next morning we began our program, with the theme of "Confronting and Creating Change in the 90's." The program chair, Keith Kroll of Kalamazoo Valley Community College created an ambitious program of 50 individual presentations Friday and Saturday. Our keynote speaker was Ira Schor who talked about a real student-centered classroom. The conference had 243 registered attendees, and it looks like our budget will be printed with nice black ink.

Our next conference will be in Livonia, Michigan, October 6 - 8, 1994. In 1995 we will meet in St. Louis, Missouri, and in 1996 in Davenport, Iowa.

At the Regional Executive Committee meeting at the end of the conference, Linda Houston was unanimously re-elected to chair the REC for another year. Connie Reimer of Kansas was elected secretary, Carol Snyder of Ohio was elected treasurer, Jay Wooten of Ohio was elected membership chair, and Mary Dunn of Illinois was elected information coordinator.

The Midwest Region voted to accept the Two-Year College English Association by-laws. The vote was taken as a voice vote at the general business meeting. The motion passed with no dissenting votes.

Pacific Northwest Regional Conference
Report to NTCC
October 30, 1993

The Pacific Northwest Conference had its annual meeting in Burnaby, British Columbia October 21-23, 1993 at the Metrotown Holiday Inn. James Janz of Columbia College in Burnaby, the local arrangements chair, did a splendid job in arranging a fine facility for the conference and Alban Goulden of the Langara campus of Vancouver Community College did his usual fine work on the presentations. There were 39 participants with 11 presenters including one surprising presenter from far off Mississippi, Nell Ann Pickett, who spoke inspiringly of the need for us to present at the national conferences as well as writing for TETYC. Other subjects covered included the connections between reading and writing by Karen Houck, former chair of the REC, the use of continuous writing of response papers in literature classes, evaluation and the part-time teacher by Ed Reynolds, evaluation for the purpose of placement, and evaluation and creative writing, "You Can't Grade That It's Art," by Roger Holdstock, Mary-Beth Knechtel, and Roger Semmons.

Late Saturday morning the REC held its Fall Meeting. After the treasurer's report was read and approved, discussion moved to the upcoming elections which will be held by mail. Fred Chancey moved that definition of membership be changed to include those who have attended one of the last three conferences and Marjorie Ferry seconded. The REC voted unanimously to approve. Nominations remain open until the end of November. Membership occupied our discussion for awhile, and Ed Reynolds suggested that he try to get the regional subscription list for TETYC and CCC. Nell Ann Pickett suggested that we request it by Zip Code. The discussion then moved to the conference site for next years conference which is still unknown. There has been one volunteer, but it is a very tenuous offer. Barbara Guiland will explore the possibility of assuming the role of national representative. At the REC, Nell Ann Pickett continued the discussion of the progress the reorganization and again invited our members to join the national organizations as well as to review for the multicultural issue of TETYC. Several people were interested. In attendance at the meeting were Ed Reynolds, James Janz, Barbara Guiland, Fred Chancey, Marjorie Ferry, Nell Ann Pickett, Peter Maides, Elizabeth Gowland, Steve Reames, and Alban Goulden.

Western Conference Annual Meeting

The Region held its most successful conference to date in Denver on October 18, 1993. The day-long program was extremely well received by the 75 - 80 people who attended the meeting. The meeting was held conjointly with the meeting of the Rocky Mountain Modern Language Association.

The Southwest Regional Conference on English in the Two-Year College (SRCE) continues to show growth and vigor in serving the some 2000 full-time teachers as well as part-time teachers of English in the two-year colleges of its six-state region--Arkansas, Colorado, Louisiana, New Mexico, Oklahoma, and Texas.

In October, SRCE met in San Antonio, Texas, for a most successful and exciting conference with approximately 250 members in attendance, although the exact figure has not been yet reported to the Executive Committee members. Highlights of the conference were (1) the keynote address by Eileen Lundy, a widely respected Associate Professor of English at the University of Texas at San Antonio and the 1993-94 president of the Texas Council of Teachers of English--an affiliate of NCTE; (2) the awarding of the Bob Wylie Service Award to Tahita Fulkerson of Tarrant County Junior College (Ft. Worth, Texas); and (3) the awarding of the Teacher of the Year Award to Betty Bastankhah of San Jancinto College (Pasadena, Texas). The Conference was honored to have NCTE President-Elect Janie Hydrick attend.

SRCE continues also to have the luxury of invitations to host the annual conference with 1994, 1995, 1996, and 1997 conferences scheduled for Laredo, Texas, Colorado Springs, Colorado, Corpus Christi, Texas, and Austin, Texas respectively.

Financially, SRCE is solvent with a balance of \$2361.87 in its treasury.

SRCE also continues to have outstanding newsletters published at Westark (Arkansas) Community College under the stellar editorship of Mike Cooper. The SRCE 1993-94 Directory will be published in December at Lee College (Baytown, Texas) under the editorship of Dale T. Adams. Finally, SRCE continues to have outstanding support from its CCCC liaison, Dr. William E. Tanner of Texas Woman's University (Denton, Texas).

Southeastern Conference on English in the Two-Year College

Report from NTCC Representative, Ben R. Wiley Pittsburgh, PA---November 18, 1993 (Meeting in conjunction with NCTE/CCCC)

SCETC had its Regional Executive Committee meeting in Atlanta, GA on October 3, 1993. At this time various issues were discussed pertaining to the regional and its activities:

1. The 1994 SCETC convention is to be held in Charleston, South Carolina, January 30-February 1. An earlier date and a different meeting day configuration was necessitated by prohibitive hotel rates for the usual Washington Birthday weekend. The conference theme is taken from E.M. Forester, "Only Connect. . . the prose and the passion."
2. Future SCETC conferences include 1995 in Jacksonville, FL (conference theme-- "Full Literacy: Our Bridge to the Future"), 1996 in Atlanta, GA, 1997 in Norfolk, VA.
3. Miscellaneous SCETC business, as discussed at its Executive Board Meeting:
 - a. Membership stands at 620 as of 10/3/93. (membership year is the calendar year). Our membership goal for 1994 is 650. Because of the financial success of the 1993 annual conference in Chattanooga, the nine hard working state representatives, and the organizational skills of our Membership Chair, our total membership continues to increase.
 - b. Fund for Excellence moneys to provide stipends for part-time faculty to attend the 1994 conference.
 - c. Another successful Summer, 1993 ITC (Institute in Technical Communication) at Hinds Community College (MS) with 30 participants
4. The proposed NTCC restructuring change was discussed, but completed copies of the bylaw changes did not reach me in time to distribute them to the REC. I am making copies for all REC members and will mail those to them in time for in-depth discussion at the Charleston conference in February. However, the REC is supportive of these efforts to provide a more prominent role for two-year college instructors at the national level and to make the voice of the two-year college instructor ore evident at NCTE and at CCCC.
- *****5. We are asking for a bylaw change (IV. A. 5. e.) that would permit making State Representatives voting members of the Regional Executive Committee. (Presently, there are 12 voting members: the 6 elected by membership, the NTCC rep elected by membership, and the 5 appointed members--4-year college rep, Journal editor, advertising manager, program chair and local arrangements chair.)

Because the nine state representatives are the crucial factor in membership growth, and because they are invited to attend the REC meetings and share their perspective, but then not permitted to vote, we want to effect this bylaw change to give a greater voice to these important people. We realize that not all regionals use State Representatives, but for those of us who do, we want to be more inclusive.
6. Congratulations to three SCETC born and bred members for their continued professional involvement at the national level of NCTE/CCCC: Betty Nelson (TN) for receiving Best Article of the Year in *TETYC* at the San Diego CCCC in March, Nell Ann Pickett (MS) for successfully completing her tenure as *TETYC* Editor and for receiving the first annual Nell Ann Pickett Service Award given by CCCC, and Mark Reynolds (AL) for being named new Editor of *TETYC*.

ENGLISH COUNCIL OF CALIFORNIA TWO YEAR COLLEGES

Report of Fall Board Meeting and Conference

- ❑ The ECCTYC Conference, "Tomorrow's Challenges, Today's Realities," was held on October 20-23, 1993 at the San Jose Hyatt. Key speakers were Al Young and Shirley Brice Heath. One hundred and sixty attended.
- ❑ ECCTYC is divided into ten regions. We are working to build stronger regions by forming Regional Councils so that every college will be represented.
- ❑ We have listed ECCTYC on InfoNet, a statewide computer network. We are encouraging English departments to use InfoNet as a way of networking, particularly so we can share information about and responses to state requirements, curriculum, assessment, articulation with four-year colleges, affirmative action and hiring policies, etc.
- ❑ We have plans to develop a workload position paper to help English departments achieve more equitable workloads for faculty. Even more important, we want to make a professional statement in regard to teaching environments and conditions. Last spring we completed a workload survey; ninety six colleges responded.
- ❑ Because our constitution is not specific about election procedures, we have amended our by-laws to more specifically describe procedures for elections.
- ❑ We also have worked to establish a better working relationship with the Academic Senate, especially in regard to English classes and historically underrepresented groups.
- ❑ We are updating our department chair directory.
